The unicorn is Scotland's national animal.

The most identifiable symbol of Scotland is tartan. This patterned woven cloth originated in the Highlands, where clan people used local plants, **moss**es and berries to dye wool before **spin**ning and **weav**ing it into tartan. The patterns consist of interwoven vertical and horizontal lines, known as a 'sett.' The tartan kilt and the sporran are parts of traditional male Scottish Highland dress.

Alongside tartan, the thistle is one of the most well-known symbols of the country. It's a **biennial** plant that grows wild and free in the Scottish Highlands. It has prickly leaves and purple flowers. Legend has it that a group of Scots warriors fell asleep, but they were saved from the invading Norse army's **ambush** when one of the attackers **trod** on a thistle with his bare foot. His cries of pain woke up the sleeping Scots who defeated the invaders.

The Highland bagpipe is considered Scotland's national instrument and one of the most iconic symbols of Scottish culture. Bagpipe music has deep roots in the Gaelic culture of Scotland. It is still hugely popular and used in military as well as folk bands to entertain at **ceilidhs**.

St. Andrew's Cross, also known as the Saltire, is the national flag of Scotland. It is a white diagonal cross on a blue background that represents the crucifixion of the apostle Saint Andrew, Scotland's patron saint. According to legend, the night before the Pictish King Angus II led his forces into battle against the army of Angles and Saxons, he had a dream in which he saw Saint Andrew. The apostle promised Angus a triumph in the battle. The next morning, the king's troops saw a huge white Saltire cross shining against a bright blue sky. This awesome sign led the Scottish troops to victory and the Saltire found the place in Scottish history. Today, it is flown on public buildings and carried by Scottish teams in international competitions.

The other 'unofficial' Scottish flag is the 'Lion Rampant.' A red lion in profile is depicted on a yellow background. It's standing upright, on one or both **hind** legs with the **foreleg**s raised as if to strike. Officially, the 'Lion Flag' is only allowed to be flown by a monarch.

Surprisingly, Scotland has no official **anthem**. 'The Flower of Scotland,' along with 'Scotland the Brave,' are among several patriotic songs considered unofficial anthems.





How to use Let's Visit Scotland

The material in each unit provides enough input and practice for students to cover during a 90-minute lesson. The tasks are arranged in the order in which they should be carried out, but the teacher should feel free to omit and/or adapt any task to match the level and needs of her students, as well as to meet the limitations of time and space in the classroom.

The following points should be kept in mind while using this book:

- The two primary purposes of this book are to focus on providing factual information about Scotland and to expand students' vocabulary range through a series of reading, listening, speaking, writing and lexical activities.
- Although grammar is neither presented nor practiced in the form of separate tasks, the Writing Hints boxes do contain some grammatical advice. It is up to the teacher to decide whether she wants to expand it or not.
- 3. While it may seem that there is a lot of repetition of factual material in each unit, it was the Author's deliberate decision. Typically, the factual material presented in the texts will be new to students, so they should be given enough time to process and digest it.
- 4. All texts in this book are recorded, so Tasks 3 and 8 may also be done as listening activities or a combination of reading and listening. For example, the teacher may ask students to solve Task 8 individually or in pairs, and then play the recording for students to check their
- 5. Task 7 is designed as guided writing but the teacher may choose to use it as a speaking activity with more proficient students. In such case, the clues given become a plan for a short oral presentation.
- **6.** Conversely, Task 6 (i.e. Speaking) may be used as a writing activity to be done in class or set as homework.

However, these points should be treated only as suggestions. Approaching this book in a flexible and creative way is strongly encouraged by the Author.
